2011 Campus Security Report

COLLEGE SECURITY

Northland Community and Technical College (NCTC) campuses of East Grand Forks (EGF) and Thief River Falls (TRF) encourages all students and College community members to be fully aware of the safety issues on the campuses and to take action to prevent and to report illegal and inappropriate activities. Personal awareness and applying personal safety practices are the foundation of a safe community.

EMERGENCIES: DIAL 9-911 to report crimes in progress or police, fire, or medical emergencies on campus. Dial 0 for assistance for campus operator.

Pursuant to the Student Right to Know and Campus Security Act, NCTC monitors criminal activity and publishes this report, maintains a three year statistical history on- campus and at recognized NCTC activities off-campus. The College communicates to students and employees via e-mail the specific web link to access the Campus Security Report. NCTC posts the report on the future student web site and the job openings web site to ensure accessibility to prospective students and employees. NCTC will provide a written copy of the report upon request.

NCTC currently has a variety of policies and procedures relating to campus security, and expressly reserves the right to revise or adopt additional policies or procedures at any time without notice. Such changes may appear in successive issues of this report.

CRIME REPORTING POLICIES

Reporting Policies:

Everyone on campus (including students, employees and visitors) are encouraged to report **immediately** any and all potentially criminal activity to the receptionist: EGF (218) 793-2800 or TRF (218) 683-8800 and/or the local police department in EGF (218) 773-1104 or TRF (218) 681-6161. Individuals reporting to NCTC, who also wish to file a complaint with the local law enforcement, will be provided with assistance from NCTC upon request.

NCTC normally requires a written complaint from an individual to begin the investigatory process. NCTC also usually needs the

assistance of the complainant in the disciplinary process against the accused. NCTC will make exceptions when necessary, including cases presenting clear danger to the victim and/or the College community.

NCTC will issue an annual report of criminal reports made to the College Attendants and law enforcement agencies for crimes occurring on college property or facilities. The annual report includes reported crimes alleged to have occurred on the campus and facilities owned or rented by NCTC and/or recognized student organizations. It includes the following **reports of crime:** Murder; Forcible Sex Offenses (forcible rape; forcible sodomy, sexual assault with object, forcible fondling); Non-Forcible Sex Offenses (incest, statutory rape); Robbery; Arson; Aggravated Assault; Burglary; Motor Vehicle Theft; and for Murders, Forcible rape, Aggravated Assault, Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of property, Intimidation, Larceny-Theft, and Simple Assault evidencing hate crimes.

The report also includes **arrests** for the following: Liquor law violations; Drug abuse violations; Weapons possession.

The Vice President of Academic & Student Affairs (EGF) or the Executive Director of Administrative Services (EGF) serves as the primary liaison for college security with all law enforcement agencies.

When reports are made to the Vice President of Academic & Student Affairs (EGF) or Executive Director of Administrative Services (EGF) it will be determined if a threat continues to exist to the campus community. If a threat continues to exist, a warning will be sent out informing the campus community.

Reporting Procedures:

All criminal activity occurring on campus should be reported **immediately** to the Receptionist and/or to the local law enforcement. The Receptionist will refer the complainant to the appropriate employee to assist the complainant in completing criminal reports. These reports will also be forwarded to the local law enforcement. In appropriate cases, reports may also be shared with the Vice President of Academic & Student Affairs (EGF) or Executive Director of Administrative Services (EGF). NCTC will assist the local law

enforcement with investigations.

Every effort should be made to ensure that physical evidence is maintained and protected. Immediate reports will assist in preserving evidence.

If you are a victim or witness to a crime:

- a. Call local law enforcement 9-911, for any emergency including medical assistance, fires, suspicious people or activities, crime reports, traffic accidents, or other illegal activities.
- b. Obtain a description of the offender(s), including sex, age, race, hair, clothing, and other distinguishable features. Attempt to obtain a description and license number of any vehicle involved. Note the direction taken by offenders or vehicles. Immediate documentation of the incident provides valuable information to law enforcement should you be either a victim or a witness to a crime.
- c. Preserve the crime scene: Do not touch any items involved in the incident. Close off the area of the incident and do not allow anyone in the crime area until campus security and/or local police arrive.

NCTC will accept third-party reports in cases of sexual assault in order to protect the victim's identity.

Individuals who file a complaint with the College will be provided a copy of the College's Complainant's Bill of Rights.

All employees who become aware of an allegation of violation of College policy, student code of conduct, civil or criminal law should report the allegation to their supervisor.

The following people with significant responsibility for student and campus activities (not including counselors) must report potential criminal activity of which they are aware to the receptionist and/or to the local law enforcement: All administrators and supervisors, Student Senate and student club advisors, athletic coordinators, and coaches.

These individuals should not attempt to investigate, but should instead report and allow the designated officer to investigate.

All individuals in the NCTC community are encouraged to assist anyone in reporting

alleged criminal activity by contacting local law enforcement 9-911, as well as providing assistance in making the report.

Student organizations with control of any facility are encouraged to report safety and security concerns to the receptionist.

Counselors are required to provide statistical information relating to crimes on campus but may continue to honor the confidentiality of victims.

POLICIES CONCERNING SAFETY OF AND ACCESS TO CAMPUS FACILITIES

SECURITY CONSIDERATIONS OF CAMPUS FACILITIES

Building access and maintenance

The NCTC campus is for the use of the students, employees, visitors and those on official business with NCTC. Access to campus buildings is limited to normal business hours.

Students, employees, and visitors are encouraged to report needed repairs to the Dean of Academic Affairs for all academic areas.

Policies and procedures for safe access to buildings:

Keys are issued to authorized employees and students only.

Exterior building doors should not be blocked open when the doors are locked.

Building evacuation is mandatory for all fire alarms.

Building doors are normally open from 7 AM until after evening classes and for scheduled weekend classes and events.

Employees who appear to be the last person in a building should ask unauthorized people to leave the premises. The building should be secured when the last employee leaves. In buildings that have outside windows, employees should close and lock them before leaving the building.

On-campus telephones are located in most building hallways for emergency calls. These telephones are also capable of dialing 9-911.

Problems related to individuals in buildings after hours should be reported to local law enforcement immediately.

Personal Security Recommendations:

NCTC will assist you in protecting yourself by providing safety and security programs, as well as various safety and security posters and brochures. However, only you can protect yourself by being aware of your surroundings and taking appropriate steps in preventing crime from happening.

Help us protect you:

Watch for suspicious people in and around College buildings and in parking lots. Do not pursue them. Call the Receptionist immediately.

Suspicious activity:

a. If you see any suspicious activity or people on or near campus, call the Receptionist immediately. Do not assume that what you observe is an innocent activity or that it has already been reported.

b. Do not assume the person is a visitor or College employee that you have not seen before.

BE AWARE OF WHAT STAFF ARE ON-DUTY DURING EVENING HOURS

College Attendants are normally on duty from 5:00 PM until 10:00 PM (TRF) and 5:00 PM until 9:00 PM (EGF), Monday through Thursday evenings when classes are in session, August through May. Patrol and escort service is normally available at that time. Call (218) 684-5915/5916 in TRF and (218) 791-0469 in EGF.

Protect yourself walking and jogging:

- a.** Avoid walking and jogging alone after dark.
- b.** Walk along well-lit routes.
- c.** Be alert to your surroundings. If you suspect you are being followed, run in a different direction, go to the other side of the street and yell for help, or head quickly for a lighted area or a group of people.
- d.** Have your keys ready when returning to your home or apartment and keep your personal or valuable items concealed and close to your body.

Protect your automobile:

- a.** Always lock your car doors and never leave your keys in the vehicle.
- b.** Try to park your car in a well-lit area.
- c.** Avoid leaving property where it is visible.

Protect your property

- a.** Participate in Operation Identification by engraving your Operation Identification number on your valuables.
- b.** Personal property (purses, briefcases, calculators, etc.) should never be left unattended. Take such items with you if you are leaving the office, classroom or home.
- c.** Lock your door whenever you leave your home or office. Always lock your door when sleeping. Always lock your car doors.
- d.** Protect all valuables in your home or office. Do not leave valuables in plain view.
- e.** You are encouraged to open a savings or checking account rather than allow large sums of money to accumulate in your home. If you open a checking account, remember the number of the last check written. The theft of a single check can go undetected until a bank statement discloses a forgery.

Protect your home or apartment

- a.** Lock your door - even if you are only going out for a short time or only going a short distance. It only takes 8 seconds to walk into your open room and steal your valuables.
- b.** Always lock your door when you are asleep. You are also encouraged to lock your door when you are awake.
- c.** Do not loan your keys to anyone - even a classmate or a friend. They may not be careful with them and may misplace them, giving the wrong person access.
- d.** Do not leave your keys lying around in public places or in your jacket pocket when you are not wearing it.
- e.** Do not put your name or address on key rings as they may be used to steal your property if found by the wrong person.

Protect yourself at night

Avoid walking alone at night. Suspicious people may be:

- a.** Loitering about at unusual hours and locations; running, especially if something of value is being carried.
- b.** Exhibiting unusual mental or physical symptoms. Person(s) could be under the influence of drugs or otherwise needing medical or psychiatric assistance.
- c.** Carrying property that might be suspicious, depending on the circumstances.
- d.** Report all thefts and property loss immediately.
- e.** Be security conscious at all times.

POLICIES CONCERNING LAW ENFORCEMENT

Neither employees of NCTC nor College Attendants are certified or sworn peace officers. Employees are authorized, when appropriate, to make a citizen's arrest. Typically, such arrests are made only in the presence of a law enforcement official.

NCTC works closely with the local police, Sheriff's department and State and Federal law enforcement agencies to track and respond to campus criminal activity.

Report all crime immediately:

All criminal activity on campus should be reported immediately to the Receptionist, and/or local law enforcement.

Report as much detail as possible to ensure accurate reporting:

If you are a victim of a crime, your immediate recall of the event is often the best. Write down as much information as you can remember after a crime. If you cannot identify the perpetrator by name, try to recall as many details as possible, including: gender; approximate age; height; weight/build; description of face including eye color, hair color, hair style (short, curly, etc.), jaw, nose; dress/clothing; facial hair; glasses; distinguishing marks, including scars; distinguishing gait; voice.

PROGRAMS TO EDUCATE NCTC COMMUNITY REGARDING SECURITY

Information concerning campus security procedures and practices is presented annually as part of the student orientation process and at an employee in-service session. Information to promote awareness of crime prevention tactics and to encourage students and employees to be responsible for their own security and the security of others is presented at those times through the use of video tapes, brochures, and speakers.

PROGRAMS TO INFORM NCTC COMMUNITY REGARDING PREVENTION OF CRIMES

The Safety committee may present seminars on all aspects of safety including the prevention of crimes. These seminars may utilize various speakers, including members of city and county law enforcement, to discuss the prevention of crime. As crime can occur both to you (your person) and your property, both areas of prevention may be discussed. All members of the NCTC community are encouraged to participate.

MONITORING AND RECORDING ACTIVITY AT OFF-CAMPUS LOCATIONS

All NCTC recognized organizations that are off-campus will still be monitored by local law enforcement. Just because an activity is located off-campus does not mean that activity at that location is not monitored. Such activity is monitored by law enforcement which shares information with NCTC.

NCTC includes the off campus student organizations' crime statistics in its annual report as part of the crime at NCTC.

POLICY REGARDING THE ILLEGALITY OF ALCOHOLIC

BEVERAGES ON CAMPUS AND ENFORCEMENT OF UNDER-AGE DRINKING LAWS

NCTC forbids the use (consumption), possession, manufacture, sale, transportation or furnishing of alcoholic beverages on campus. NCTC also forbids the maintenance of unlawful drinking places on campus. This prohibition of possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages on campus applies regardless of age. The only exception is authorized use for special (non-student) functions. Only the President may authorize such programming use.

NCTC enforces the Minnesota drinking laws, including the prohibition of use by persons under 21 years of age, and College policy. Possession or consumption of alcohol on campus is prohibited by NCTC and may result in a student disciplinary complaint.

If the accused is not cooperative or is underage, local law enforcement may be called to assist.

Policy Regarding the Illegality of Drugs on Campus and the Enforcement of Federal and State Drug Laws

NCTC forbids the possession, use, or sale of illegal drugs (other than by a doctor's prescription) on campus. This includes but is not limited to possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs.

NCTC enforces both Minnesota and Federal drug laws regarding the use, possession, and sale of illegal drugs.

DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE EDUCATION PROGRAMS

The purpose of this policy is to set forth the College's policy regarding alcohol and other drug use, including unlawful drug use or abuse in the workplace in accordance with the Drug Free Workplace Act of 1988 (Public Law 100-690, Title V, Subtitle D) and Drug Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989 (Public Law 101-226). A copy of the Drug Free Workplace may be obtained from Student Services staff. Interested individuals may obtain a copy of the brochure as it lists policies and programs.

Information concerning the possession, use and sale of alcoholic beverages and illegal drugs, enforcement of Federal and State drug laws and descriptions of drug and alcohol abuse education programs is provided during orientation sessions in compliance with section 1213 of the Higher Education Act of 1965 as amended (PL 101-266).

The College recognizes the reality of chemical dependency and is aware of its occasional presence in the College community. As a safeguard against this dependency, numerous campus organizations provide prevention programs to the NCTC College community. The Student Services Office provides employees to aid students in coping with alcohol and drug abuse.

POLICY REGARDING SEXUAL ASSAULT PROGRAMS AND PROCEDURES

Policy

NCTC's policy on sexual abuse and harassment is governed by the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities System's policy. In support of the system policy, NCTC reaffirms the policy that sexual abuse and harassment will not be tolerated. Every effort will be made to assure that all members of the College community are provided an atmosphere free from sexual abuse and harassment. To prevent sexual abuse and harassment, educational efforts will be undertaken to inform employees and students of their responsibilities regarding such behavior, how to identify and eliminate potential sexual abuse and harassment and what steps can be taken if instances of sexual abuse and harassment are experienced.

NCTC conducts a number of programs aimed at preventing sexual offenses and making the community aware of the potential of such crimes. These programs include inspecting the campus for potentially dangerous areas and implementing programs to inspect campus lighting and shrubbery. In addition, educational programs concerning sexual assault awareness are provided.

A guiding principle in the reporting of sexual assault is to avoid revictimizing the sexual assault survivor by forcing the person into any plan of action. Sexual assault survivors may contact the Student Services Office or community services for assistance. The following resources provide immediate aid or on-going consultation for survivors of sexual assault.

Procedure: Contact the receptionist as soon as possible after the offense. Please remember it is most important to preserve evidence.

Do not bathe, douche, use the toilet, or change clothing. Note everything about the location. If you have been raped, you should seek medical attention immediately regardless of whether you report the matter to law enforcement.

A medical examination is important to check for sexually transmitted diseases or other infection/injuries, or for pregnancy concerns. Physical evidence must be collected within 72 hours of the assault, and only at a certified medical facility, upon request of a law enforcement agency.

Every attempt is made to maintain the anonymity of the sexual assault survivor. Every attempt will be made not to release names to the media. Unless requested by the sexual

assault survivor, names and addresses of survivors are released to the police department. Student Services will attempt to provide support and advice for sexual assault survivors. Each report of sexual assault will be investigated in order to provide better protection to the survivor of a sexual assault and all members of the College community. Sexual assault survivors should be aware of the need of the College to release information regarding the fact that an assault has occurred for the protection and safety of others.

The Human Resource Department will be the office of official record for reports of sexual assault, as it is in all reported law violations. Students and employees are encouraged to contact the Human Resource Department to report any information regarding assaults.

Sexual assault survivors have the right to have reports made anonymously (third party) to local law enforcement. Human Resources will assist the survivor in making this report if the survivor so wishes. In these situations, the name of the complainant will not be forwarded. Third party reports may prevent the College and the police from actively investigating the criminal activity.

Counseling and medical services are available both on and off campus. If you are the victim of a sexual assault, NCTC encourages you to contact the Student Services Office, a Rape & Abuse Center or a local hospital.

If the Vice President of Academic & Student Affairs (EGF) or Executive Director of Administrative Services (EGF) determines that a threat continues to exist for the community, information about the reported sexual assault will be reported to the campus community whether reported by a sexual assault survivor or through a third party report. As much detail as possible regarding location, date and time of the assault, and any information which might help identify the assailant will be reported. The campus community will be informed of the reported sexual assaults by e-mail notification.

Each report will be taken as presented by the complainant. Appropriate criminal classifications will be determined after a review of all facts by law enforcement and/or sheriff department personnel.

The College will take appropriate action to safe-guard the alleged survivor and, at the same time, protect the rights of the alleged perpetrator. If the survivor of a sexual assault requests, the College will make changes in the survivor's academic situation, if reasonably available.

The College will normally not take any disciplinary action against a member of the campus community without a written complaint and the assistance of the complainant in the disciplinary process, unless the College determines there is a clear danger to the victim or the College community.

Procedures for Campus Disciplinary Action for Sex Offenses

The College disciplinary process is an option for any person wishing to report a case of student misconduct. In order for NCTC to proceed, a written complaint (whether by the victim or a third party) must be filed. If the complaint is criminal in nature, it may also be forwarded to law enforcement.

There are different standards of proof in the College conduct proceeding than in the possible criminal action. The College conduct proceeding determines whether the accused's status as a student will be altered, whereas the

criminal process determines if there will be limitations on the accused's liberty. As there are different standards and the purpose of each proceeding is different, NCTC encourages students who are the victim of sexual assault to go forward with the College process.

Both the accuser and the accused are entitled to have others present (an advocate or advisor) during the disciplinary proceeding. This person may not, however, speak in your place or ask questions of witnesses.

Both the accuser and the accused have the right to call a reasonable number of witnesses during the proceeding to testify on their behalf. The witnesses may be asked questions by the other party.

Both the accuser and the accused have the right to request in advance the names of witnesses and shall have the right to question witnesses during the proceeding.

Both the accuser and accused shall be informed of the outcome of the College disciplinary proceeding concerning the complaint of sexual offense. This information should not be disclosed to the public generally.

Sanctions following a College disciplinary proceeding include but are not limited to: Referral to the Vice President; completion of an education program; suspension or separation from the College; referral to law enforcement agencies for prosecution of charges; expulsion from the College.

Crime Definitions

Arson—Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Negligent manslaughter—The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Nonnegligent Manslaughter—The willing (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another.

Robbery—The taking, or attempting to take, anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or

threat of force or violence and/or putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault—An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. (It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed).

Burglary—The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes, unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Motor Vehicle Theft—The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as a motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned including joyriding.)

Weapon Law Violations—The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; possessing deadly weapons; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Drug Abuse Violations—Violations of State and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making or narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana, synthetic narcotics (Demerol, methadones); and dangerous nonnarcotic drugs (barbiturates, Benzedrine).

Liquor Law Violations—The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting; the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to a minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition).

Forcible Rape—The carnal knowledge of a person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her temporary or permanent

mental or physical incapacity (or because of his/her youth).

Forcible Sodomy—Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

Sexual Assault With An Object—The use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

Forcible Fondling—The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or, not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.

Nonforcible Incest—Nonforcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

Nonforcible Statutory Rape—Nonforcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property – To willfully or maliciously destroy, damage, deface, or otherwise injure real or personal property without the consent of the owner or the person having custody or control of it.

Intimidation – To unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to physical attack.

Larceny-Theft – The unlawful taking, carrying, leading or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Attempted larcenies are included. Embezzlement, confidence games, forgery, worthless checks, etc., are excluded.

Simple Assault - An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration, or loss of consciousness.

Crime Report Categories:

I. Campus crimes are those that occur in any building or property owned or controlled by NCTC within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution and are used in direct support of, or in a manner related to, the institution's educational purposes. This category should also include those crimes that occur on property within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution that is owned by the institution but controlled by another person, is used by students, and supports the institutional purposes.

II. Public Property crimes are those that occur within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution, such as a sidewalk, a street, other thoroughfare, or parking facility, and is adjacent to a facility owned or controlled by NCTC if the facility is used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to the institution's educational purposes.

III. Noncampus Building or Property crimes are those that occur in, 1) any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization recognized by NCTC; and 2) any building or property (other than a branch campus) owned or controlled by NCTC that is used in direct support of, or in relation to, the institution's educational purposes, is used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution.
